The bookings have been coming in thick and fast. Currently we have 2307 beds booked (not including the wait list), out of a possible 3680. We still have a lot of vacancies for June and September. The vacancies page is being kept up to date by our Web Chief, so have a look and plan you next holiday.

General News

NEW KOSCIUSZKO NATIONAL PARK ENTRY STATION FOR 2006

This season you can expect to drive through a brand new multi-lane Park entry station on the Kosciuszko Road.

In a joint \$2.5M project between the NPWS, Department of Commerce and the RTA, the entry point for inbound car access to Perisher Blue will be at a new 4 lane, 7 booth facility at Sawpit Creek, on the site of the old Service Station.

This site is 4km further uphill than the old station, which was a peak-period bottleneck for everyone.

The new facility is being fast-tracked to the target completion date of the June long weekend.

The aim of the project is to significantly improve fast access to the resorts with 2 lanes dedicated as express lanes for current Season Pass, Multi-day or special permit holders.

The single lane Kosciuszko Rd will progressively widen on approach to the entry station, and signage will guide you to the appropriate lane and booth.

The two 'express lanes' will be closest in parallel to the road, so that a quick visual confirmation of your pass will allow you to drive on through.

Other lanes (further to the left) will be designated for those purchasing day or Season Passes on the spot, and the furthest left lane will be a dedicated Bus only booth for tours and shuttle services.

Jindabyne NPWS Officer Steve Reddon advises IAC Members the importance of having your Pass pre-

purchased in advance of entry, so that you will simply drive through, rather than be backed up with others wanting to pay via EFTPOS or Credit Card in peak times.

Cold Facts asked for clarification on the issues of Sawpit Creek carpark's future and the Park entry pricing increases as of 1 October 2006.

Steve advised that although the carpark now is currently part-filled with heavy machinery and plant, it will continue to remain as a floodlit gravel parking area for long-stay users of the Park. This will not be affected by the presence of the new entry station.

(Ed – good news for all, and the aim of having the station a non-pedestrian zone may keep the carpark assured without any new 'mini-visitor centre' facility. Sawpit carpark hitch-hiking regulars may find better options here too.)

The increased Park entry charges from October are a sore point for all, however the NPWS have given assurance that the factor of increase on 2005 rates, whatever level of Pass is purchased, is 100% routed to the Kosciuszko National Park exclusively.

As an example, Steve cited the pricing difference between the 05/06 Season Pass to 06/07. This \$60, no matter where in Australia you buy the Pass, will be channelled back to the KNP.

Rumours in relation to the benefit only being passed on if Passes were bought in Jindabyne were false, he said.

Currently the Sawpit Ck site is awash with activity and the Kosciuszko Rd adjacent has a 200m one-way section restricted by temporary traffic lights to alternate uphill/downhill traffic flow.

First Tracks

How do you test for the ideal Alpine Boot-fit? Top ski coaches recommend the 'shell fit' method. This method ensures there is match in:

- **Boot length**
- **Boot width**
- **Boot contours**

The following steps should be followed to determine if the boot shell and the skier's feet are matched in **length**:

*Pull the liners out of the boots and place feet into the empty shell. Move feet towards the front of the shell until your big toe contacts the very front of the boot.

*Flex forward and check the gap between your heel and the shell – if your index finger can fit in the gap with a little 'wiggle room' then fit for length is correct.

The **width** of the shell of the boot and your forefoot must match so that your forefoot can spread in the boot when bearing weight.

*With foot centred in boot shell, open the lower shell as wide as possible and check for contact with sides of your feet. Check for a symmetrical clearance on both sides. Shell contact on both sides means boot is too narrow for your foot – try another brand.

Matching the **boot contours** with the anatomical shape of your ankle and foot is also important.

*Does the area around your ankles match the boot's shell contours?

*Does the position of your ankle bones align?

*Does the size and position of the heel match?

If a significant difference is found, try another brand.

This method might just help find the right boot for your comfort and a real aid to carving performance.

Last Run

Jindabyne's Marty Whittington usually has to drive 2 hours to get his surfboard wet but on Wednesday the waves came to him, crashing into the shore of Lake Jindabyne.

He had to deck himself in a full-body wetsuit and boots to brave the waters of the lake, and the surf was only a metre high, but Mr Whittington was still able to ride the wind swell for a good 20m - something he had always dreamt about doing.

"I've had worse surf in the ocean," he said.

"The locals say on a windy day, 'You could surf on the lake today', but no one has ever done it, not that I know of."

He lasted long enough to catch 10 waves before his ears felt as if they were going to snap off and he called it a day, but he hasn't ruled out adding surfing lessons to his Jindabyne Adventure Bookings business.

He decided not to relive the experience yesterday, saying the wind had started to come off the snow-covered mountains and was that cold his ears would definitely have come off second-best.
